To coincide with the tercentenary of the birth of David Hume in 2011, IASH seeks to establish an annual David Hume Fellowship. The Fellow's work will be concentrated on the pursuit of Hume studies or a related topic in Scottish Enlightenment. The Fellowship will be prestigious and competitive, attracting outstanding scholars in any aspect of the expanding field of Hume studies.

David Hume lived and produced much of his important philosophical and historical work in Edinburgh. He and his associates were at the heart of the intellectual, literary and cultural events that are now known as the Scottish Enlightenment. The Institute has a long-standing importance as a centre for Scottish Enlightenment and a long history of research Fellows who come to IASH and the University to work on Scottish Enlightenment projects. The Hume Fellow will greatly enrich this already thriving area of work within the Institute. The David Hume Tercentenary Fellowship will once again make The University of Edinburgh an international centre for Hume Studies.

Our aim is to provide sufficient capital to enable The University of Edinburgh to fund The David Hume Tercentenary Fellowship scheme in perpetuity. The capital required to establish a permanent endowment is £850,000. This would provide an average grant of £25,000 to attract a notable Hume Scholar. It is hoped to be able to announce the Fellowship during the International Hume Society's Conference, hosted jointly with IASH, in 2011.
